Between Sept 2021 and July 2022, our team of eight excellent adult volunteers delivered a diverse and fun programme for girls and boys aged between six and fourteen, with help from parents and 7 young leaders. We have awarded 383 badges across the group, including 6 Gold Awards and so many others from astronomer, navigator and artist to cyclist and paddle sports. Beavers and Cubs carried out community fundraising activities for Chesham's Community Fridge and the Ukraine and held a local camp. Scouts organised an expedition camp at Speen and canoeing and kayaking camp at Dorney Wood, and day activities including rock climbing, tobogganing, rifle shooting, air ball and games in the woods. We entered two teams of four scouts in the Quest 12-hour hike in the Misbourne Valley. We are so proud that three explores who graduated from Tyler's Hill Scouts were selected to represent the UK at the World Scout Jamboree in South Korea in July 2023. It's been quite a year and wonderful for the children to experience again the full range of scouting activities.

1st TYLERS HILL BROWNIES

1st Tylers Hill Brownies have had another busy term of fun and learning. We all refreshed our memories on fire safety and practised a fire drill for the hall as well as some activities and games to help us think about how to react in an emergency at home.

We celebrated Easter with a chocolate and egg themed evening - we had fun, resist-dyeing eggs with onion skins and leaves, making chocolate crispy nests (complete with eggs of course) and playing a covid-safe version of the 'chocolate game' with a mini chocolate bar each to open with a knife and fork.

As part of St George's Church's bid for Eco Church status the Brownies and Guides are helping to improve the woodland area for wildlife. During the Easter holiday we had a fun afternoon where we built the giant bug hotel that we designed earlier in the term, as well as some small bug houses that we hung in the trees. We also helped to decide where the nest boxes the Guides made would be placed. As the Brownies were leaving, we were delighted to see two deer running through the woodland area.

We are monitoring wildlife sightings in the church yard and woodland area, and would be happy to hear from anyone who has something to add to our lists – please either email me or add them to the list on the noticeboard in the Bangay rooms. The Brownies made lists of things that animals need to survive; and one that everyone said was food.

We asked the church wardens if we could plant some sunflowers along the fences and they readily agreed so we spent part of a meeting planting the seeds and the leaders have looked after them until they are big enough to plant out. Hopefully by the time you read this they will be growing well, not eaten by the rabbits, and later in the summer will be providing nectar for the insects then seeds for the birds.



We had two exciting outings - at the end of May lots of the Brownies joined the rest of Girlguiding Chesham Vale for an activity day at PACCAR Scout campsite where they got to take part in traditional camp activities as well as climbing, tunnelling and archery. Then in half term a small group of Brownies and leaders attended the Platinum Jubilee parade and beacon lighting in Ley Hill, which was a fantastic experience.

Following on from our planting of the sunflowers, the church wardens asked if the Brownies would like to take over the care of the round flower bed at the front of the church. It's now looking really good with its red, white and blue themed flowers for the jubilee. The Brownies take turns to water each week and remove the weeds. Hopefully it will encourage some of them to do their Grow Your Own Badge.

Leading up to the beacon lighting we were entertained by the evergreen Aldbury Morris Men and the music of Dr Hooley at The Crown. There was definitely a feeling in the air that after the last couple of years we had some catching up to do in having a good time! The pubs it seemed were almost overrun! Then after the beacon had burned spectacularly heads turned to our firework display on the common, the feedback from which has been excellent. A fabulous finale to the evening. 
LEY HILL TODDLER GROUP

NATURE NOTES

Sitting outside on still summer evenings, we might well hear the sharp if slightly alarming cry of the wonderful little owls, which occupy nests and territory around our village. Spread widely across the Old World, the little owl was not found in England until its introduction here by Victorian ornithologists. It is now widespread, though not common, across England and Wales.

Little owls have a particular penchant for barns and outbuildings, where they can find secure hidey-holes with good, high views of their immediate territory. Their chicks are a favourite food of their larger cousin, the barn owl, which explains their preference for homes with narrow entrances and, ideally, a separate internal chamber for the nest proper.

Readers of News and Views without barns but with an open wall might like to build a nesting box for little owls designed along these lines – https://www.bto.org/our-science/projects/nrs/about/little-owl provides an excellent example. I set one up in 2020, but am yet to have it occupied!

The little owl is of course widespread in Italy, where it became associated in antiquity with the goddess Athene. Also in Italy, tamed little owls were used by hunters of birds to draw out their

quarry, since small birds will mob owls in an attempt to drive them away.

With the Roman occupation of Britain, little owls as symbols of Minerva have found their way on to coins, frescoes and mosaics of that period – so although not appearing in person until the 1880s, the little owl has been among us for a very long time indeed.

As those readers with children at Ley Hill school will know, there is nothing **tam sapiens quam strix**

MY FAVOURITE RECIPE

I've listed below my mother-in-law's recipe for gingerbread. I hadn't made it for years then in lockdown I unfortunately discovered that I can still bake a pretty good cake. After a disaster with a new recipe for ginger muffins I dug this out and had forgotten how good it is!

GINGERBREAD

INGREDIENTS

1/4lb / 115g butter

1/2lb / 225g syrup + 1 tablespoon of black treacle

1 egg

1/4lb / 115g caster sugar

3/4lb / 350g S R flour

1 teasp of ground cinnamon

3 teasp of ground ginger

1/2 teasp of bicarbonate of soda

1/2 pint of hot water

Stem ginger, chopped (optional)

METHOD

Put butter, sugar and syrups in a pan and melt.

Mix together the dry ingredients and pour in the melted butter etc

Add the egg and hot water and mix well

Add the stem ginger and stir through if used

Pour the batter into a lined square/oblong pan and cook for 35-40 minutes at regular 6, fan 180C or 200C or until cooked through.

WHERE SHALL WE GO TODAY?



Once a chalk quarry, College Lake is now one of the Berks, Bucks & Oxon Wildlife Trust's flagship nature reserves.

College Lake is widely regarded as one of the best places in Buckinghamshire for water birds, and with many hides overlooking the lake, this is a great destination for bird watchers or for families, whatever the weather or time of year.

The marshland is perhaps the most important of the reserve's homes for wildlife, as in the summer it supports a number of breeding waders. These include lapwing and redshank, both of which are rare species, and College Lake is a key breeding site in Buckinghamshire. In the lake, common terns nest on specially created islands. In the winter, the inhabitants of the water change, and wintering wildfowl, such as wigeon and teal, from Scandinavia and beyond, use the wetlands for feeding and roosting.

Elsewhere on the reserve, chalk grassland is alive with colour during the spring and summer as a wide variety of flowers come into bloom. These support a range of insects, including a number of rarer butterfly species such as the small blue. Rough grassland provides a home for breeding skylarks, as well as shelter for small mammals, which in turn feed birds of prey such as kestrels and barn owls. Woodland, scrub and hedgerows are widespread across the reserve, and support a wide variety of wildlife, including finches and tits and in winter. thrushes such as fieldfare and redwings. An unusual feature of College Lake is the Cornfield Flowers project that started in the 1980s. College Lake was one of the first places in the country to actively conserve these rare and beautiful flowers, and the reserve now produces a glorious show of colour every year during June and July.

- Find out about the old farming methods that we still practice here in the Farming Exhibition.
- Visit our 'Outlook Inn' a hands-on wildlife treasure box for under 5s.

Hedges

Several parishioners mentioned overgrown hedges in answer to the recent survey. We have reported hedges on common land to Bucks Council who will be trimming them in the coming weeks. However, we have been asked to remind landowners and house owners that it is their responsibility to maintain their hedges especially when the hedge abuts a footpath or a road. If this is not carried out and the council deems it a risk to pedestrians or vehicle drivers Transport for Bucks will cut back the hedge.

Refuse Collections

We are aware that there have been several problems with refuse collections recently particularly since our collection days have changed but hopefully these have been sorted out by now. We have also been asked to request that residents are mindful of where they or visitors to their properties park since there have been several instances in the village when the refuse collection lorry and workers cannot get access to the bins which need emptying.

Painting the Beacon

It was great to see the beacon alight during the Jubilee celebrations, but it is important that each time it is lit it must be painted. However, it is proving difficult to find someone to paint it for us. COMMON LAND

We wrote in the last news and views about common land in the parish, and it has been pleasing that parishioners have asked for advice or clarification. The issue of what to do with common land is a growing concern for the whole county, and just recently the county presented an expert in the field, who is advising the council. His presentation can be viewed on the parish council web site: www.latimerleyhillparishcouncil.co.uk

Below is a summary of the main points:

(1) There are grey areas:

The rules about common land have developed over the last 1000 years, and had become a little muddled. There were 2 attempts to clarify this, in 1965 and 2006. The bad news is that neither of these acts were completely comprehensive, and as a result there are still some grey areas. For example: solicitors tend to use the Land Registry to identify land ownership, and the 1965 act set up a different common land registry. Consequently, they may have different views on the same piece of land.

(2) They are trying to develop some consistencies.

In response to the recent survey, we were asked to install more benches. The parish council can support the installation of benches on common land, which can be secured safely, but they cannot have concrete surrounds. Similarly drives and paths that cross common land, can be maintained with loose materials like chippings, but the county council has stated that it will not allow permanent materials like kerbstones and block paving.

Common land is there for all parishioners to enjoy and everyone has the right to complete access with no obstructions to this land. Occasionally common sense suggests that parishioners can cross common land in vehicles, assuming they don't damage it. However, Bucks council have made it clear, common land **cannot** be used for parking, even if it is next to your property, and it cannot be fenced or "claimed" by installing pots or posts. In addition, advertising like for sale signs should be limited to the owners own land.

BIRD BOXES

We have exciting news! Volunteers from the Chiltern Society and an owl expert have opened and checked the owl box and the four tit boxes to see if they have been used.

And the great news is that they have all been used! All four tit boxes have old nests and feathers inside; one even has three old eggs in, which did not hatch because either they were infertile or there were too many eggs in the nest to be incubated by the parent bird.

Inside the owl box, two dead Gliss gliss, a dead mouse and a dead jackdaw as well as owl pellets were found indicating that the box is being used by a tawny owl. The best time to see the tawny owl is at dusk so why not take an evening walk through the trail then?

The tit boxes will now be cleaned out and the findings will be recorded so we can analyse the findings in the future.
