


SNOW KISSES


On behalf of us all involved with the Hall I wish you all a very Merry Christmas and all the best for 2023.

CANAL BOATS

And, 20 seconds later I was back on the boat. The funny thing was at no point did I really feel scared. I suppose I could say that the churches' canal boat weekend went swimmingly. The whole idea was trying find a point of contact between all the different churches that we have spread across our Methodist Circuit. It's not like we have some sort of big city plonked conveniently in the middle for us to all aim for. In fact, the really really big city that is near us, is not only outside our area but has a tendency to draw people away.



Let me describe the scene. When Peter, the circuit bursar, and I first picked up the boat there was a steady drizzle falling. I have to be honest and say that I did wonder if being out on the canals in October was a bit of a daft idea. The persistent rain seemed to seep into everything, and not even constant tea brewing offset the chill. On the other hand, the quiet of the canals, the beauty of the overhanging trees and branches, and the drifting smoke from the warm looking houseboats, created a picture of impressionist beauty. What in some ways will always remain an industrial landscape, also pulls the peace of the countryside into the hearts of towns and under roadways.

It was then with joy of course, that setting out from Croxley Green and heading towards Hemel and Winkwell (the swing bridge which is probably the closest point to Ley Hill), the sky was clear. The brisk chill of the morning hinted at a warm day ahead. Along the route we stopped, prayed with people, ate bacon rolls and met a diverse range of humanity; both from the churches and strangers on the tow path. I can't help but feel that there is a very important ministry to be explored amongst the folk who choose to live, exercise, and philosophise in this magical place. The members of the churches that joined us ranged from a man two weeks off of being 100 years old, to a very highly trained 15-year-old scout. Church members walked alongside, with or without dogs, assisted with locks, and occasionally steered the boat. They also helped to consume vast quantities of cake and biscuits. I'm still trying to untangle and deliver presents that were gifted along the route to go to other churches.

In the end it was a watery pilgrimage, a successful gathering of the faithful, and a true meeting with community at the edge. I've learned more about our area in two days than I could ever have imagined. Not only was it a very physical voyage but, I think also, something of a spiritual one. I know for me it was an answer to prayer.

There will no doubt be more adventures like this. Possibly involving canal boats, but also buses and trains. I might draw the line at aircraft. I think there's something important about us travelling together, a visible witness to the spiritual side of life.

In conclusion, mission accomplished. Lots to learn of course, not least that ministers should avoid falling in the canal. Oh yes, I should have mentioned that, on the first day, at Home Park lock, whilst pulling on a wet rope I managed to miss the back of the boat and plop like a disgruntled frog into the deep water. All I remember is seeing the bubbles above my head as I reached up my hand. I was grabbed by Karol from Kings Langley; and, 20 seconds later I was back on the boat ...

NATURE NOTES

MUSHROOMS

Autumn is by far the best time of year to spot....mushrooms - in woods and gardens around the village. Neither plant nor animal, the fungi from which mushrooms grow are a delicate network of fine filaments, either underground or within the substrate of a supporting tree. In many cases fungi can be huge subterranean structures, taking nutrition from decayed animal and plant matter. In this way, fungi are natural composting agents, secreting enzymes to break down the food that they then absorb.

Mushrooms are the fruit of the fungus and release seeds (spores) to germinate elsewhere. Mushrooms often appear around trees, which can draw water down through the mushroom and its underground network of delicate roots, in return for which the tree provides nutrition for the fungus. The sudden appearance of mushrooms after rain is due to the rapid intake of water by the fungus, causing tiny buds on it to "blossom" into the variety of structures that we see.

Mushrooms can be capped, cupped, puffballs or truffles, with a spectrum of edibility from toxic to delicious. A well-known, red-capped "toadstool" is the fly agaric; other mushrooms easily identified are the jellied ear and giant puffball. All three are reasonably common and can be seen around and about. In fact the fly agaric may well be the inspiration for the red and white garb favoured by Father Christmas and his ability to make his annual time bending "trip" around the world...

HOW TO USE FIX MY STREET

IRRITATING POTHOLES AND ANNOYING FLY TIPPERS

How do I report these to Bucks Council? A quick guide:

Go to https://www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/

Scroll down to 'Parking, roads and transport' and click on this link Click on 'Report problems on roads, streets and pavements'

Here you can report around 12/13 various problems from potholes to fly tipping, from dead animals to overflowing bins, fr

potholes to fly tipping, from dead animals to overflowing bins, from dog fouling to overgrown hedges etc

You must have an email address to use the online reporting system (FixMyStreet).

Often this will take you to 'Start' or 'Report here'. A photograph, postcode and email are needed, and if you are already registered with Bucks Council then this will speed up the process.

You can see whether your problem has been previously reported.

LEY HILL CRICKET CLUB

Ley Hill Cricket Club had its most successful season yet, with the Saturday first team winning the prestigious Berkshire, Chiltern & Mid Bucks Championship with a game to spare.

Normally this would allow us to be promoted to the Thames Valley Cricket League. However we've received the news that the Thames Valley Cricket League will not allow us in this season owing to perceived problems with the road running down the edge of the ground.

We're hugely disappointed; it's a big blow to a club that is trying to progress. But we're not giving up. We'll work with the TVCL to pursue our ambition of bringing a higher standard of cricket to Ley Hill whilst retaining the friendly, progressive culture we're known for.

Cricket is very much a team sport but Craig Peterson's contribution to the first team's success this season stood out. 1138 runs at an incredible average of 103.45 with 6 centuries and 3 fifties. Lewis Thompson, Ben Moultrie-Ford and Max Lee, the latter recording his maiden century, all made significant contributions with the bat. Lewis also took 31 wickets, second only to Joe Yerrell's 33, with the evergreen Craig Ottaway and Jonny Carpenter also taking over 20 wickets each.

In the other teams, the Saturday second team continued its progression, winning half of its games to end with a mid table finish in the Mid Bucks Division 3. This is a development side and saw great contributions from junior cousins Ted and Ed Sussum.

On Sundays, the cricket was both competitive and social. Another Sussum, Rob, enjoyed a golden season, taking 27 wickets, with Brad Norton leading the way with the runs. Notable contributions with the bat were also made by Ted Sussum and Brayden Doran.

MY FAVOURITE RECIPE

Taken from *Usborne Cookery School – Cakes and Cookies for Beginners*, this apple cake recipe has been a family favourite for many years. Great at this time of year when we have loads of cooking apples on the trees. The cake is also really nice warm from the oven with ice cream.

My daughter on the other hand much prefers it with custard! 2

Apple Cake

You will need either an 8" round or 7" square, loose bottomed cake tin. Makes about 12 slices

Ingredients

175g (6oz) Wholemeal self-raising flour

175g (6oz) caster sugar

1 teaspoon baking powder

3 eggs, lightly beaten

175g (6oz) soft margarine

1 rounded teaspoon ground cinnamon

50g (2oz) chopped mixed nuts

1 cooking apple - about 250g (8oz)

Demerara sugar for sprinkling on top



Method

Line the cake tin.

Turn oven on to 170°C, 325°F, Gas mark 3

Sift the flour into a large bowl and tip in the grainy bits left in the bottom of your sieve.

Add the caster sugar and baking powder

Add the lightly beaten eggs, margarine, cinnamon and half of the nuts.

Using either a wooden spoon or food mixer mix everything together really well.

Spoon the mixture into the lined tin and smooth the top.

Peel, core and thinly slice the cooking apple and arrange the slices on top of the mixture, overlapping each one.

Sprinkle the apples with the remaining nuts and a tablespoon of demerara sugar.

Bake the cake for an hour until it is firm.

I have a fan oven and do find that this cooks within 50 minutes.

Leave the cake in the tin for ten minutes before slipping off the ring of the tin and lifting the cake off the base. Leave to cool.

Cadent has not been communicative with local residents (certainly those living in Ley Hill at least). So this is a quick online guide on how to find out what exactly is going on:

Go to https://www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/

Scroll down to 'Parking, roads and transport' and click on this link

Scroll down to 'Check for roadworks and closures' and click on this

Click on the green box 'Check now'

This will take you to one.network

Depending on your computer settings, this may take you straight to ongoing roadworks in your area. If not, you will need to add your postcode into the top left search box to take you to the live map locally. Also in the top left is an option box, where you can select either 'Today or Next two weeks/three months/twelve months'.

A little flame in a circle indicates gas works, a phone indicates BT or fibre works, a tap indicates water works, a man with a shovel indicates road works, a thunderbolt indicates electricity works, plus other special events such as Christmas road closures or HS2 closures.
