AS MAD AS A MARCH HARE

To be "as mad as a March hare" means to behave excitably and unpredictably and can refer to both people and animals. The idiom, which was first mentioned in the 16th century, describes the springtime escapades of hares, boxing each other and jumping vertically during the breeding season, mainly in March.

An early verbal record of this animal's strange behaviour occurred in about 1500, in the poem Blowbol's Test where the original poet said:

Thanne bey begyn to swere and to stare, And be as braynles as a Marshe hare (Then they begin to swerve and to stare, And be as brainless as a March hare)
The phrase was popularised in more recent times by Lewis Carroll in his 1865 children's book Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, in which the March Hare is a character.

On the final Monday in January every year the Hall's governing body, The Ley Hill War Memorial

Institute, holds its Annual General Meeting and thank you to those that came along. It is an opportunity to look back on the year just gone and it was a pleasure to see the use of the Hall in 2022 back to pre-Covid levels. The Jubilee weekend was probably the highlight but some one-off social events ran it close, notably the Classic Cars show which took place on a blazing hot day and amongst other things raised over £1,000 for Thames Valley Air Ambulance via a bucket collection. NEWS FROM THE MEMORIAL HALL

Like most organisations, an AGM often is the time for personnel change and there are a number of these to report. We were delighted that our plea in the last edition of News & Views for a few more volunteers to step forward and serve on the Management Committee did not fall on deaf ears and we have welcomed Steve Thorp, Katie Naylor, Sally Greenhill, Neil Branscombe and Lesley Tinine to our team. Thank you all. We are also starting up a new informal group, 'Friends of the Hall', who we can call upon to help out as required. Sarah Peterson has written separately about that in this edition. NATURE NOTES

FEATHERS! As spring unfolds with fresh colours, its glorious hues include the many different plumages of our garden and woodland birds. Feathers are the defining feature of birds, setting them apart from all other animals since the time of dinosaurs. Essential for flight and display, feathers also provide insulation and protection. To do this, birds have evolved a range of feather types, each with unique adaptations and functions.



The most basic feather type is the down feather, which provides insulation and warmth. These are found all over a bird's body and of course are important for young chicks, which are more vulnerable to the cold.

Contour feathers are the most visible and give birds their shape and aerodynamic profile. They have a central shaft with barbs that interlock to create a flat, smooth surface and provide a waterproof barrier. Contour feathers are found on the wings, tail, and body of birds and vary in size and shape depending on their location. Their overlapping structure also provides a measure of protection against predators and helps absorb impacts.

Flight feathers are a subset of contour feathers and provide the lift and propulsion needed for flight. They are found on the wings and tail of birds and have a rigid, asymmetrical shape that creates a curved surface. This allows air to flow over the wing, generating lift. Flight feathers are particularly important for hunting, navigating and escaping predators. Owls have specially shaped feathers that, along with large wings compared to their body size, generate significant lift to allow slow, silent flight.

The colours and patterns of feathers also play an important role in their owners' survival and reproduction. Brightly coloured feathers serve as a form of display, to attract mates or deter rivals. More muted colours allow birds to blend into their environment and avoid predators. Birds of dusk and dawn often have drab upper plumage to help them rest unnoticed during the day, but bright white patches beneath to aid display in poor light.

Whether for insulation, flight, display, or protection, feathers are an essential component of the avian anatomy and a testament to the remarkable diversity of nature. Happy Easter!

THE SWAN UPDATE

Since the owners announced in 2016 that they planned to sell The Swan, it has been, and continues to be a long process. SOS was formed in 2019. Following 3 failed planning applications for Changes of Use and a rejected Appeal (in October 2022), SOS contacted the owners again, this time asking if they could keep us updated and could we rekindle negotiations once they had decided on their plans.

On 23rd January, the Parish Council were notified by Buckinghamshire Council that the owners intend to proceed with the sale of The Swan pub. Since The Swan is listed as an Asset of Community Value, any Community Interest Group can register an expression of interest to bid for the property. In order to do that, SOS (LHCPL) must have registered an interest before 3rd March 2023. This would then action a 6 month moratorium period (starting from 20th Jan 2023). During that time the owners can continue to market the property and enter into negotiations with other interested purchasers but contracts cannot be exchanged until after the six months period has finished.

We were in the same situation two years ago and spent more than 6 months trying unsuccessfully to negotiate a purchase price. This time, it does follow 3 failed applications for change of use plus a failed Appeal. The owners have acknowledged that SOS is able to submit a bid and have said that we can do so by writing to them. After careful consideration, SOS have decided not to notify the Council because (1) SOS can still offer a bid without triggering the moratorium period (2) other potential buyers can progress interest at any time and (3) the owners are under no obligation to accept any bid from SOS even if the moratorium period were triggered.

Pubs are struggling at the moment and some are closing but those that provide a good offering are still busy (eg Queen's Head, White Lion, Red Lion, Green Dragon, White Hart and many more). Community focussed pubs and other community enterprises are continuing to be very successful. It's a tough job being a successful landlord but we know that there are people out there wanting to do it and to provide a community facility.

The aim of SOS has always been to maintain The Swan as a pub for the Community and are still hoping to negotiate the purchase of the property. However, in parallel, we would also welcome any other purchaser to buy The Swan so long as it is kept as a pub. Since negotiations between SOS and the owners to date have been unsuccessful, if you, or anyone you know, might be interested in buying The Swan as a pub, please encourage them to contact the owners directly since they have told the council that they intend to progress with the sale of The Swan.

LEY HILL METHODIST CHURCH

To the left of Ley Hill Memorial Hall as you face it, is a small church building known affectionately as "the Chapel". It has stood in that spot on the Green since 1887, and generations of local people have been married there. Now it's all modern inside with comfy seats and heaters. The chapel is used by a local church community of people mainly from Ley Hill and Botley, and some come from Bovingdon and Chesham too. It says "Methodist" over the door but in fact the church has people from many Christian traditions like Brethren, Baptist, Anglican and Catholic, or none at all. We are not worried about that - only some would class themselves as actual Methodists. We are in good relations with other local churches.

The church community has all ages. There are toddlers, children, and grown-ups and some into their 90s. Some of them are new to the village, or new to faith, and others have been coming generations. The worship combines modern songs and the best of the old, led by a music group. There is even a choir you can join, which puts on concerts from time to time. If you are a Christian in the village and have not tried us, or never said hello yet, please come along and introduce yourself, or if you are just curious a welcome will be made for you. There is a service every Sunday at 11am, and after the service there is a cup of tea or coffee and biscuits and a chance to say hello and chat. There is a notice board outside the chapel if you want to see what's on or who to contact.


MY FAVOURITE RECIPE


Reflections on being a Scout Leader


