Well done to all involved in its organisation, notably Sarah and Dave Peterson, Angie Gregory and Sue Woodstock and all their helpers; and of course the entrants!

Other events have included a Roaming Supper back in early July which Mike Appleby and Sue Woodstock arranged and was very successful. This seems to be an increasingly popular 'mystery dinner party' which starts and ends in the Hall but includes various host houses in between. It's a novelty format to eat, drink and meet existing and new friends in the neighbourhood. Dave and Sarah organised a very well attended Quiz Night in early October which raised money to cover the exceptional costs of the Coronation celebration which the Hall sponsored to a significant extent. Although not Hall organised, Sam Guerin and her team have now held a couple of barn dances for all the community to attend, including a delicious supper, that whole families can enjoy as they start and finish early. Thank you Sam and company; they were great fun. And coming up as this magazine is being compiled is a return to the Memorial Hall of the world famous Ley Hill Luvvies who are performing a comedy play called 'The Quartet'. Good luck to Paul Woodstock and the Luvvies with that. The proceeds are donated to local charities. Ley Hill has become well respected for the efforts that are made to recognise Remembrance Day every year. By the time you read this hopefully you will agree that this year's display at the beacon was very appropriate. The beacon was sponsored by the Memorial Hall originally and is now an established focal point in the village. Indeed at the time of writing I understand that Ley Hill School is planning a parade to the beacon on 10 November having to lay stones painted with poppies. Thank you to Neil Lamond, Joe Walsh. Anne Birkett, the Parish Council and others for the work you do in making the beacon such a striking feature, particularly for the November remembrance purposes.

Maintenance of the Hall itself is not carried out by the fairies which may surprise some of you but we are lucky to have a fabulous cleaner in Vicky Povey and a Management Committee that ensures as far as possible that everything is in order for our hirers. Recently we have had the kitchen 'deep cleaned' and some worn out carpeting is being replaced and flooring issues in the toilets are being attended to. It's not all glamour! We are also looking at replacing fluorescent lighting with LED and improving our noise control system.

On the people front our Committee Secretary Chris Lewis has passed the secretarial baton on to Liz Thorp who many of you will know I'm sure. Thank you Chris for your service as Hall Committee Secretary for many years and to Liz for taking the task on. We now have both Mr and Mrs Thorp on the Committee! Chris continues as a Trustee.

We moved to Ley Hill in 1986 (it seems like yesterday) and whilst there have inevitably been ups and downs rarely a year goes by without something memorable happening. A few spring to mind. 

Winter is finally here and as the long nights draw in, this is an exciting time for scouting. On a Thursday evening, Tyler's Hill Scouts aged 10 to 14 are busy carving pumpkins, playing wide games, doing night hikes, and learning about fire lighting and fire safety. Here's a taster of what's involved:





To achieve their Fire Safety Activity Badge, scouts need to:

- 1. Explain what action should be taken and why, if you discover a fire has broken out in the home or at camp.
- 2. Explain the process of combustion.
- 3. Be aware of dangers in the home and the fire precautions necessary for:
- a. oil heaters and open solid fuel fires
- b. portable electric fires
- c. drying clothes
- d. electric wiring and fuses
- e. smoking paraphernalia, particularly matches
- f. uses of household gas, including gas fires
- g. party decorations and candles
- h. closing doors and windows
- i. using BBQs
 - 4. Explain the benefits of installing smoke detectors.
 - 5. Learn what the dangers of campfires are and what precautions should be taken.
 - 6. Find out about the causes of heath and grass fires.
 - 7. Learn how to make an emergency call for the fire service.
 - 8. Identify different fire extinguisher types such as water, dry powder, foam and carbon dioxide.
 - 9. Find out what to do if a person's clothes are on fire.
 - 10. Talk to your family about what to do in the event of a fire at home.

MY FAVOURITE RECIPE

Chocolate Cherry Fingers

INGREDIENTS

115 grams margarine or butter

60 grams granulated sugar

300 grams of dried, pitted dates (chopped)

200 grams glace cherries (chopped)

90 grams dried cranberries

4 cups of Rice Crispies

Pack of dark cooking chocolate



METHOD

Melt the margarine or butter with the sugar in a large pan and then add the rest of the ingredients.

Cook slowly for about 10 minutes until the fat is absorbed into the fruit.

Mix well and press the mixture firmly into a 20cm x 35cm baking tray, using the back of a spoon.

Finally melt the cooking chocolate and spread evenly across the top.

Unfortunately, it wasn't high enough in the sky during the meeting but most of us saw it on our way home. The following week we did activities and games on a space theme, including making a scale model of the solar system along an unrolled toilet roll stretching from inside the hall to halfway across the carpark! NATURE NOTES



GLIS GLIS

As we move into winter the longer, darker nights might bring to mind the response of many mammals at this time - and, in effect, certain insects - to sleep their way through the cold weather, waiting for spring. The glis-glis is one of these, unusual in Britain but reasonably common in our area of the Chilterns. Along with the muntjac and wallaby, they are another animal brought to Britain by the Rothschilds at Tring at the turn of the last century, and as we know have since proliferated. In fact there are a number of glis-glis in and around Pancake and Hockeridge woods outside Ashley Green, in the Royal Forestry Society plantation there. The plantation is also notable for having been donated to the Society in the 1980s, by the great-great-granddaughter of the first Duke of Wellington, and readers may know it has a magnificent avenue of Giant Redwoods - Wellingtonia. Of course the glis-glis also enjoys cosy spaces on our attics and outbuildings!

Glis-glis can live for up to ten years, and though their hibernation takes up seven months out of every twelve, they find time to breed over the spring and summer. They will often take over the nests of bats and birds where these are inside a tree or nest-box. Their breeding cycle is such that, if the weather, temperature and forage are not conducive, embryos can be reabsorbed by the mother, undeveloped. In this way the female glis-glis is able to control reproduction.

It is well-documented that the Romans ate glis-glis, and this is a tradition that lives on today in Croatia and Slovenia, where the hunting season begins in October. Baking is a favourite method of cooking glis-glis, though this does not leave much to the imagination.

Despite being an alien species, glis-glis are protected in Britain but may be removed under licence from Natural England.

GREATMOOR—ENERGY FROM WASTE

Greatmoor energy from waste - opening to the public

Do you ever wonder what happens to the things you put in your waste bin?

All of the residual (non-recyclable) household waste generated in Buckinghamshire is now processed at the Greatmoor Energy from Waste facility, at Woodham, near Aylesbury. Greatmoor is operated by FCC Environment, in partnership with Buckinghamshire County Council.

Greatmoor has the capacity to treat up to 300,000 tonnes of waste a year (approximately 900 tonnes a day), waste which would otherwise have gone to landfill. As a result, it generates a minimum of 22 megawatts of electricity to the national grid – meeting the energy needs of around 36,000 homes.

This alternative treatment of waste will result in a saving to Buckinghamshire County Council of approximately £150 million over the life of the contract.

Greatmoor houses a visitor centre, and guided tours are available by prior agreement, at no charge. Tours are open to local organisations, clubs, schools (Key Stage 2 and above), colleges and universities. If you aren't a member of a local group but would like a tour, why not organise a group of your friends for a visit, or come to one of our open days?

Latimer & Ley Hill Parish Council oversee the care and maintenance of Tyler's Hill Burial Ground, a place that holds a special meaning for our community. We take great pride in ensuring that these sacred grounds remain a place of beauty and tranquillity.

We work hard to make sure the burial ground looks its best. This includes regular grass and hedge cutting, tending to the trees and keeping the brambles in check, and ensuring that gates and benches are always in top-notch condition.

In addition to the physical upkeep, we also handle the day-to-day administration of burials and plots, making sure that everything runs smoothly.

When a plot is purchased or an interment takes place, we provide clear guidelines and regulations to ensure that our burial ground remains a respectful and pleasant place. We're here to help everyone understand what's allowed and what's not.

We recently conducted a thorough cleanup of the burial ground and wanted to share some important information from our regulations. These guidelines are meant to remind those who visit their loved ones here and to inform those who may not be familiar with our rules.

- 1.Please remember that, aside from floral bouquets, we kindly ask that no other tributes be placed on the graves. Items such as vases, lamps, solar lights, pottery, glass jars, tins, plastic, toys, storm lanterns, windmills are not permitted on the graves.
- 2. We reserve the right to remove flowers, plants, or wreaths from any grave if they become unsightly. Christmas wreaths will be removed after 3 months.
- 3. You are welcome to plant trees and shrubs up to 30cm high on full-sized grave plots. However, we ask that these plantings are modest and in front of the headstone, confined to the area of the grave plot. The maintenance of this area falls to the grave plot deed owner, and overgrown plantings may need to be removed.
- 4. The repair of memorials or any items permitted on the grave is the responsibility of the grave owner.

By working together, we can continue to ensure that the overall appearance and atmosphere of our beloved burial ground is preserved. Let's cherish this special place and keep it a comforting haven for our community.
